PRESIDENT'S MONTHLY REPORT

As the year comes to an end, I would like to review what **YOUR** WWN HOA Board has accomplished for you – the WWN Community.



The Board decided at the first meeting that our primary goal was to make this community a more involved, active, fun community. In order to accomplish this, we decided it would take hard work on our part but if you, the community, responded by becoming more involved we were willing to put in the time. In spite of unanticipated issues that we had to deal with, some of which were beyond our control, we persevered. We started by saying we needed two Board meetings per month in order to accomplish our goals. After five months of these extra meetings the Board had set up the procedures needed to be able to accomplish what needed to be done with a normal meeting schedule. As a team we never wavered from our plan, as you, the community, signed up to help us with set-up, clean-up, or whatever assistance we needed. We even had non-Board members come up with their own ideas for events and ran them.

As a Board we wish to thank the Community for coming together and we hope this is just the start of a more active Community in the years to come. I would like to take credit for what has been accomplished this year, however, the biggest thing that I did right was to allow the talented members of the Board to do their jobs the way they believed they should be done. My two biggest disappointments this year are: 1) that we still have a lack of Community members excited enough to join the Board. In January, one of the new Board's first tasks will be to find a seventh member; 2) we didn't complete our work on changes to the By-Laws. A lot of hard work has been put into this project, which will be completed, hopefully, early in 2024.

I'm proud as a member of the Board to provide a list of most of our accomplishments in 2023. To all of those who assisted in any way, including attending any of these accomplishments, I thank you for your support. I will be a member of the Board again next year, though I don't know in what capacity, and look forward to your continued support. You can all be proud of the following that was accomplished this year:

<u>Completed Projects:</u> 1) New Digital Sign; 2) Finalization of Spectrum Deal (provided by previous Board); 3) Negotiations of a reasonable monthly rent increase; 4) New and Improved Newsletter; 5) AED Improvements – training, equipment upgrade and inspection schedule; 6) Website – upgrade program, new Webmaster, easier to activate, password security for specified files, community phone list – update at least monthly.



- 1. Jack Nicholson was very interested in playing Ralphie's dad. But casting (and paying) Jack would have meant doubling the budget, so he was removed from consideration. Director Bob Clark (who didn't know Nicholson was interested at the time) says Darrin McGavin was the perfect choice. After all, Jack would have been too much of a scene-stealer.
- 2. What does Porky's, the raunchy '80s teen sex movie, have to do with a wholesome film like A Christmas Story? Bob Clark directed both -Porky's in 1982 and A Christmas Story in 1983. If Porky's hadn't given him the professional and financial success he needed, he wouldn't have been able to bring A Christmas Story to the big screen.
- 3. For those keeping count, Ralphie says he wants the Red Ryder BB Gun 28 times throughout the course of the movie. That's approximately once

every three minutes and 20 seconds.

- 4. Peter Billingsley, who played Ralphie, has been friends with Vince Vaughn since they both appeared in the CBS Schoolbreak Special (their version of the after-school special) in the early '90s. Peter doesn't do much acting these days, but he did make a surprise appearance on the "Vince Vaughn Wild West Comedy Show" in Memphis, TN, in 2005.
- 5. Mythbusters tested whether it was possible to get your tongue truly stuck on a piece of cold metal. Guess what? It is - So don't triple dog dare your best friend to try it.
- 6. Scott Schwartz, who played Flick (the kid who stuck his tongue on the frozen flagpole), was submerged in the adult film industry for a number of years. - 9. The TV show The Wonder Years was inspired by A Christmas Story. In fact, in one of the last few episodes, Peter Billingsley appeared as one of Kevin Arnold's roommates.
- 10. The real Red Ryder BB Gun was first made in 1938 and was named after a comic strip cowboy. You can still buy it today for the low, low price of \$44.99. But the original wasn't quite the same as the one in the movie - it lacked the compass and sundial that both the Jean Shepard story and the movie call for. Special versions had to be made just for A Christmas Story.

OLD-TIME CAKE DOUGHNUTS

2 tablespoons butter, softened

1 ¹/₂ cups sugar divided

3 large eggs, room temperature

4 cups all-purpose flour

1 tablespoon baking powder

3 teaspoons ground cinnamon, divided ¹/₂ teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon ground pumpkin-pie spice ³/₄ cup 2% milk Oil for deep-fat frying



Directions:

In a large bowl, beat butter and 1 cup sugar until crumbly, about 2 minutes. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition.

Combine the flour, baking powder, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, salt and pumpkin pie spice; add to butter mixture alternately with milk, beating well after each addition. Cover and refrigerate for 2 hours.

Turn onto a heavily floured surface; pat dough to $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch thickness. Cut with a floured 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch doughnut cutter. In an electric skillet or deep fryer, heat oil to 375 degrees.

Fry doughnuts, a few at a time, until golden brown on both sides. Drain on paper towels.

Combine remaining sugar and cinnamon; roll warm doughnuts in mixture.



December (www.historyplace.com)

1, 1640 – A nationalist revolution in Portugal led to independence from Spain as the Spanish garrison were driven out of Portugal.

1, 1918 – Iceland was granted independence by the Danish parliament.

1, 1925 – The Locarno Treaties were signed by France, Belgium and Germany, as a preventive measure to avoid another war, in the aftermath of WW I. Terms of the *Locarno Pact* were guaranteed by Britain and Italy.

3, 1931 – British dominions gained complete legislative independence as the Statue of Westminster gave equal status to the dominions of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Iceland and Newfoundland.
